Re: Minerals Sourcing Statement

To our valued customers,

In July 2010, the United States enacted the Conflict Minerals provisions of the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act, HR 4173, Section 1502 ("Conflict Minerals Act"). The Conflict Minerals Act requires, among other things, that companies perform due diligence on their supply chains regarding the source of conflict minerals defined in the Conflict Minerals Act to ensure such conflict metals are "DRC conflict free".. Conflict minerals are defined in Section 1502 of the Conflict Minerals Act as cassiterite (a primary tin ore), columbite-tantalite (coltan, the mineral from which tantalum is extracted), gold, wolframite (a tungsten ore), and any other minerals determined by the Secretary of State to be financing conflict in the Democratic Republic of Congo and its adjoining countries ("DRC countries").

Rocore has identified and verified its sources of minerals incorporated into its products to confirm that, to the best of its knowledge: they do not originate from DRC countries, and are therefore conflict free.

*Some of our products do contain tin (Sn) in metal form. The tin (Sn) in metal form is not purchased in the DRC. However, Rocore does not, within its organization, possess the capability to trace, with certainty, the origins of the mineral concentrates for the production of this tin (Sn) in metal form. Rocore however endeavors to use commercially reasonable efforts, via a supplier declaration process, to verify the source of the minerals which are incorporated into the purchased tin (Sn) in metal form and endeavors to seek those sources that can assure that conflict minerals are not incorporated in its purchased tin (Sn) in metal form.*

Rocore will continue to monitor and perform a reasonable due diligence within its supply chain to ensure that the minerals used in our products are not procured as "Conflict Minerals".

We anticipate this statement satisfies your concerns regarding our products and requirements for conflict minerals use. If not, please contact us and we will do our best to provide additional information.
